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England's health inequalities pose a growing challenge for all of us. Addressing health inequalities is now one of the top priorities for the NHS. **Professor Sir Michael Marmot** was asked to lead a strategic review to develop a joint approach to tackling health inequalities.

This conference will give you the opportunity to hear more from Sir Michael about the review's findings and recommendations. It will provide a unique opportunity to consider the essential role of third sector organisations in addressing the problems.

During the day you will have the chance to discuss with colleagues from across the sector some of the specific challenges we face and how the Marmot Report can help your organisation's work.

You will have the opportunity to learn from keynote speakers as well as having the chance to attend two interactive workshops during the day to discuss issues in depth.

The event has been organised by the Department of Health's Strategic Partners, a wide ranging group of third sector organisations working with the Department to strengthen links between it and the sector.

The event will:

- raise awareness among the third sector of the health inequalities challenge
- disseminate findings and recommendations from the Marmot Report
- identify some of the cross cutting issues of particular relevance to the sector
- provide a forum to develop understanding of the role of the third sector in addressing health inequalities
- help third sector organisations understand how the Marmot Report can support their work.



Workshops

1. The third sector role and capacity-building needs in responding to the Marmot Review

This workshop will explore the implications of the review for the sector and the support and investment needed to enable groups to play a strong strategic and delivery role. Discussion will include the roles for and synergies between infrastructure and front line groups.

2. Marmot: the implications for children and young people

This workshop will explore the implications of the Marmot Review on children and young people and look at ways of encouraging their participation in shaping health services.

3. Responding to longer-term challenges and an ageing population

This workshop will look at how we respond to the ageing population and develop services that will meet the future needs of older people.

4. Personalising inequalities: ensuring that individual requirements remain central

This workshop will examine the relationship between economic inequalities and other population-level predictors of poorer health outcomes (e.g. race, disability, gender). It will also explore the relationship between local needs of diverse groups and the policy priorities identified by the Marmot Review.

5. Practical prevention

This workshop will share innovative ideas that third sector organisations have developed to tackle health inequalities in their communities. These will be simple ideas that you could run in your organisation with no cost.

6. The Marmot Review: implications for health and social care service users including disabled people

This workshop will explore the factors contributing to health inequalities for health and social care service users. This perspective will be compared with the more holistic approach adopted by the disability and service users movement. What can we learn from grassroots organisations to take forward the spirit and learning from the Marmot Review at a strategic level?

7. Exploring equality intersections

This workshop will explore intersecting inequalities by looking at evidence on discrimination and disadvantage of two groups of people: older Caribbean men; and young Asian girls.

8. Health inequalities and learning disability: what do they mean for service providers?

What role can service providers play in tackling the health inequalities experienced by people with learning disabilities? Drawing on case studies this workshop will discuss how service providers can support people with learning disabilities to improve their quality of life and life expectancy through examining barriers to healthcare that contribute significantly to health inequalities.

9. Volunteers in health and social care – tackling health inequalities

This workshop will explore the vital role of volunteers in tackling health inequalities. It will draw on learning from programmes that have focused on health inequalities and how the learning from these and other third sector interventions are being used to inform development of Department of Health's policy on volunteering.
